Structure, governance and management

Type of governing document

Haemophilia Scotland converted to a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation) on 14 May 2015. Prior to this it was an unincorporated organisation with a constitution dated 3 October 2014. The SCIO constitution was amended on 17 July 2016.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

The Constitution of Haemophilia Scotland provides for up to 12 trustees who must be a member of the organisation in order to be eligible. Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting or by co-option by those elected following the Annual General Meeting. One third of the Trustees retire at each AGM (the third is comprised of the longest in office since last elected/re-elected).

Objectives and activities

Charitable purposes

- (a) To further as a primary objective the health, education, wellbeing, and the social and economic welfare of all those in Scotland with a bleeding disorder and their families.
- (b) To further the health, education, and the social and economic welfare of the haemophilia and bleeding disorders community in Scotland and internationally. And in furtherance thereof:
 - (i) To bring together individuals and organisations that share such interests.
 - (ii) Where possible, to cultivate reciprocal relations with organisations that have similar aims, relevant health, social welfare and educational objectives or which may otherwise support or benefit the SCIO.

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects

Haemophilia Scotland meets its charitable purposes by providing;

- Direct support and opportunities for members of the Scottish bleeding disorders community to support each other through events and mentoring.
- b) Independent and patient friendly information relevant to living with a bleeding disorder.
- Advocacy services to represent people with bleeding disorders and work closely with the Scottish Haemophilia Centres and other key stakeholders to secure the best possible treatment and care.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

Support

Children and Families were given an opportunity to meet each other and form supportive peer to peer mentoring links at our Pirate Golf Day. A similar swimming extravaganza was held later in the year with support from the specialist physiotherapist from the Edinburgh Haemophilia Centre and with Jack Bridge, Haemophilia Paralympic swimmer, as our special guest. The event launched a new information resource on the importance of an active lifestyle for children and young people with bleeding disorders.

Our first Women's Day event was held in Glasgow and was used to establish that there was demand for a women's group.

The mentoring work of Haemophilia Scotland adopted a new model and language. Describing the peer to peer relationships formed as links made it clear that they were mutually beneficial.

Support was also provided to those affected by the contaminated blood disaster with a Memorial Event. Participants included bereaved families, effected people and their families. It was attended by the First Minister, Deputy First Minster, and Cabinet Secretary. The event marked the launch of a contaminated blood memorial fund which is raising money to build a lasting memorial to the victims of the contaminated blood disaster in Scotland.

An event was held for adults with bleeding disorder at Go Ape. The event sought to encourage an active lifestyle and to provide an opportunity for younger adults to meet.

Information

Haemophilia Scotland presented the Scottish case study at the Irish Haemophilia Society's European Hepatitis C Conference. This event also provided us with the latest information on the treatment of hepatitis for our members. This built on the information already provided at our Hepatitis C Information day. Further information was gathered by our Chair at the World Hepatitis Summit in Glasgow.

As members of the Scottish Contaminated Blood Financial Support Review Group we were able to provide detailed information of its work on our website. The minutes from all meetings were published as soon as they were available.

The Haemophilia Scotland website (www.haemophilia.scot) continued to grow with regular updates and new information pages. A new facility was launched to let visitors see which publications produced by third parties and Haemophilia Scotland were available for order. There was an increased emphasis on responding to breaking events, for example, ensuring people had they information they needed during the closure of the Forth Road Bridge. Additional information was also added including guidance on dental health.

Our first Annual General Meeting as a Scottish Incorporated Charitable Organisation (SCIO) was held as part of a residential Gathering and Conference. This event provided a wide variety of information and discussion sessions covering topics ranging from dentistry and the new Network to psychosocial support and relaxation techniques. There was also a keynote presentation on understanding inhibitor risks from the Chair of the United Kingdom Haemophilia Doctors Organisation Working Party of Inhibitors.

Advocacy

Haemophilia Scotland presenting a briefing on the Penrose Report to the Scottish Parliament Cross Party Group on Rare Diseases which stressed the need to pay attention to risk and safety when seemingly life changes advances are made in the treatment for rare conditions. Our media work also continued to keep the contaminated blood disaster in the media while a way forward was agreed. Articles ran in several major Scottish

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period (continued) newspapers. Our engagement with the Scottish Parliament continued with a submission to the Health and Sport Committee's enquiry into the proposed Duty of Candour.

We were represented on the Scottish Contaminated Blood Financial Support Review Group by our Chair and CEO, two campaigning Haemophilia Scotland members were also members of the group in their own right. Haemophilia Scotland conducted the consultation exercise on behalf of the group which included holding six meeting for those affected to have their say across Scotland. A consultation survey was also conducted and analysed and the results of the exercise directly influenced the recommendations of the Group. In parallel to the Group, Haemophilia Scotland advocated for an interim augmented winter fuel payment to be made. Although this proposal was supported by the Scottish Government it was not blocked by lack of support from elsewhere in the UK. Once the Group produced recommendations, Haemophilia Scotland advocated for their rapid implementation. To address the needs of those infected in England but living in Scotland, Haemophilia Scotland also made a submission to the Department of Health (England) consultation on financial support payments. Our Chair gave evidence to the Scottish Parliament Health and Sport Committee when it enquired into what progress was been made in response to the Penrose Report. The committee secured an assurance from the Cabinet Secretary that eligibility criteria for support would be reviewed.

The National Managed Clinical Network for Inherited Bleeding Disorders, also known as the Scottish Inherited Bleeding Disorders Network, was launched. Haemophilia presented on patient expectations at the launch and was central to discussion about the structure of the Network. Haemophilia Scotland promoted the work of the Network and encouraged patient and parents to join the working groups.

Our patient organisation submissions to the Scottish Medicines Consortium continued to support the approval and introduction of direct acting antiviral treatment for Hepatitis C. Access to treatment for those with genotype 3 was particularly highlighted.

Public awareness of bleeding disorders were raised by participating in the Miles for Haemophilia campaign. The increased effort in awareness raising was demonstrated by our participation in two International Science Festivals with our crime scene display which increased knowledge about bleeding disorders.

Haemophilia Scotland also joined a wide variety of charities working with people with hepatitis C at the World Hepatitis C day in Glasgow. Other awareness days supported included Self-Management Week, World AIDS Day, Rare Diseases Day, International Women's Day, and Rare Diseases Day.

Haemophilia Scotland served on a National Procurement group working on the tender for the home delivery contract.
